Cyanotype Workshop Thursday 04 September - Paul Esdaile

Over the past 12 months we have held two cyanotype printing workshops. This allows us to create a print from a digital negative without using a dark room. The last workshop held on Thursday 04 September.

The process was developed in 1842 by Sir John Herschel. The cyanotype solution is made from combining equal parts of potassium ferricyanide and ferric ammonium citrate. This is then painted onto watercolour paper and kept out of the sunlight until it is time to expose the print. When a photo negative is put on the paper, covered with glass, and then exposed to ultraviolet light parts of the image change to a Prussian Blue. The rest of the unexposed area can be washed off leaving a blue monotone positive print.

There are many more bleaching and staining processes that can take place after the print has dried, but we haven't explored those possibilities yet.









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


Bullseye Glass Visit September 2025 Portland Oregon John Rossberg








My visit to Bullseye Glass was nothing less than an **inspiring** experience! So many new techniques so many new ideas, not only for myself but for others using Glass in our Shed.

MEMBER PROFILE - Dante Ballarino

Dante's father immigrated to Australia from Piemonte, Italy in 1924 on the ship SS Regina d'Italia. On this ship was a noted film director Angelo Drovetti who filmed the sights migrants saw on their seven week voyage from Genoa to Brisbane. This silent film was lost for some eighty years and only found some two years ago.

Dante's father worked on the cane fields around Ingham and with a brother in law bought a farm in the Burdekin at Jarvesfield where Dante was born in 1934. Dante's mother's ill health caused him and his mother to go back to Italy soon after his was born and they returned in 1939 prior to the hostilities in Europe.

In 1941 Dante's father purchased a farm in Redlands and this is where he grew up. At the conclusion of Junior he chose to be apprenticed as a motor mechanic as he was besotted with motors and motor vehicles. This was in 1951 and was with a long established motor garage in Stones Corner. In 1963 he gained employment with a

vehicle manufacturer as a service engineer, visiting dealers in Queensland and Northern Rivers, NSW.

In 1970 the company ceased operation in Queensland as a distributor/manufacturer and he remained resident service engineer until 1975. The company returned to Queensland as a vehicle distributor and in conjunction with the truck and bus division he was State Service Manager with responsibilities to dealers and the running of a large workshop including the training of dealer service staff, some thirty five staff in all.

In 1980 Dante was employed to establish a car dealership as an "add on" to an established prestigious German vehicle



In mid-2009 Dante joined Mens Shed Carina which was being established by Georgie Hickey. Meetings were held at premises in Wecker Road, Mt Gravatt, With an


increase in numbers and a need to operate power tools the group met at Norcombe Street under Georgie's house.





Not in my Lifetime

I was born at a time when human space travel was non-existent, though comic book space travel was all the rage. The Jetsons had flying cars, and superman had perfected the art of zooming through space with the greatest of ease.

A decade later, the first man-made rockets were being fired into space, details of which were screened at your local Newsreel Centre. Then with the advent of television, we were able to see black-and-white films of world events, and to learn about the race between Russia and America to achieve the most powerful rockets to lift off Earth and venture into space.

At this stage, I never expected (in my lifetime) to see a man land on the moon. But it came sooner than expected. I was in my first job with the Department of Supply (which ran the earth tracking stations in Australia) and allocated the role of spokesperson at Apollo exhibitions being held in 1968 in capital cities. It opened up the fascinating world of lunar travel, with astronauts circling the moon, landing on its surface, and returning safely to earth.

The next step (which I didn't expect in my lifetime) was the establishment of the International Space Station circling the globe. It's not easy to hop on and off a space station as one party discovered when their return transport failed and they were obliged to spend an extra nine months circling the globe.








Editor's Note

It was the kind of suggestion that most married men have received during their many years of compatibility -cooperation-connubial bliss (to avoid the cold shoulder for at least the weekend).

It was something like that in our house recently, and brethren, there should be a law against Ladies Magazines that put forth ideas of how easy jobs can be around the garden. There's nothing like pictures of well-dressed happy housewives swanning around a garden (like a botanic garden that is!) walking on a professionally laid pathway around immaculately tended flower beds and a picturesque veggie patch. Great Moments in Science with Dr. Karl Kruszelnicki

Chocolate, grass clippings and old socks — Why do old books have such a distinct smell?



When you step into a second-hand bookshop, how do you describe the scent that instantly overwhelms you, filling your nose with the nostalgic smells of stories past? Some will turn straight to the word "musty", while others are more creative with their descriptions.

Words like chocolate, leather, grass clippings and vanilla are widely thrown around, while others describe the feeling and memories the scent evokes. "People were invited to say what they think were the most wonderful smells, which would then be protected," science commentator Karl Kruszelnicki said. "Of these scents there is the sake distilleries, the sea breeze, ancient woods and, wait for it — a street lined with bookshops. What cultured people they are."

Books are degrading with time

Books have been around for more than 4,500 years and, originally, they were written on papyrus in scrolls before evolving through time to the paperbacks and the ebooks we have today.

Dr Karl said the smell of old books was caused by the chemicals used in the paper, ink, and glue degrading and emitting gases.

"The smell of books, well they range from slightly acidic to musty," he said. "There is a whole bunch of people describing how books smell and they come out with things like chocolatey and old and burnt and of rotten socks."

"You have the inherent paper, then the chemicals that were used at each stage, some of which remain in the paper and haven't been properly taken out. "Then the chemicals will each break down at rates and emit gas at different rates." He said the scent of books relied on the different papers and chemicals used, as well as the era they were made in.

A glossy coffee table book would smell a lot different to a cheaply made black-and-white paperback. The era and methods used at the time also determined the survivability of the books. "You can read a book from 150 years ago and you can read a book from 1,000 years ago," he said.

"But a lot of the pulp fiction from the early 1920s you cannot read because they were just coming up with cheap paper for the masses. "So to make it easy they just left the acid in the paper, so many of those books are dying, they are actually degrading away."

Why do old books bring back memories?

For many, the smell of an old book will flood the brain with nostalgia and comfort. Dr Karl said the rush of memories from the smell of an old book was created by our most basic instincts.

He said smell was not wired in the forebrain, or the motor cortex, but in the basic central brain. "Smell is really important to us, because every living creature down to a single bacterium has a sense of smell," he said. "It [smell] is wired in at such a fundamental level. "A smell from your past can bring back memories like the smell of a car that you got a ride in with your family sometime, or your mother's perfume she wore on days for special."







"Well, just two, said the golfer, "I have trouble parallel parking and every time I get an erection, I get a




